**LLOYD, DAVID RHYS CADWGAN, Lieut. Royal Flying Corps,** Yr. Son of Llewellyn Lloyd of the Yew Trees, Kirby-le-Soken.Co.Essex, MA. Cantab., J.P.co.Flint, by his wife, Annie Gertrude, Dau. Of Richardson Andrew;

bn.Tendring,co.Essex,20 Jan 1897;educ. Halton;Tring, and Oakham School;
Joined the Essex Yoemanry 16 Sept.1914;gazetted 2<sup>nd</sup> Lieut. The Loyal North Lancashire Regt.
29 Dec. following served with the Expeditionary Force in France and Flanders from
30 Nov.1914;was wounded 1 July,1916;transferred to the Royal Flying Corps 28 Sept;
Promoted Lieut. 1 Mar.1917;returned to France 19 April, and was killed in aerial action over
Marquion, near Cambrai,16 June 1917.

His Commanding Officer wrote: "everyone liked your son immensely; he was a fine and fearless pilot – almost the best in the squadron – and an undeniable fighter. I miss him dreadfully" Unm.
